




The City Of Enterprise A Veteran Friendly Town!

The City of Enterprise is definitely a Veteran friendly town! During the week of Veterans Day, there were no less than four specific events supported by the city and local businesses honoring Veterans.





On 8 November, at John D. Henderson Park and the Wall of Freedom, the local Disabled American Veterans Chapter 9 sponsored the annual wreath lying at the wall. The guest speaker for the event was LTC Ed Adams, the Commander of the 1st Battalion,

212th Aviation Regiment, with very inspirational words reminding us all of the definition of Veteran and all it entails.

At 1720 on 9 November, the city conducted a Parade





of Veterans honoring Veterans from all time periods since World War II. Around fifty local Veterans walked from the Courthouse to Main Street along College Street, and back. Local businesses and the city supported the event with golf carts for those Veterans that are less mobile than their service days. Special thanks go to the Enterprise City Parks and Recreation Division, Sam Boswell Honda, The Bridges at Tartan Pines Golf Course, The Enterprise Country Club Golf Course, and Post 6683 for use of their carts.

Immediately following the Parade of Veterans, the city conducted the Veterans Tribute where two Post Members, Max Roberts and CSM Mike Isom were presented as the Veteran and Active Service Member of the Year for 2021.



Command Sergeant Major Mike Isom is a thirty-year veteran of the United States Army, including service in several combat and contingency operations including Operations Uphold Democracy, Joint Guard, Enduring Freedom and Iraqi Freedom. He is a consistent supporter of the City of Progress and an integral member of the Military and Veterans Affairs Committee as well as a member of several Veteran Service Organizations.

Staff Sergeant (Retired), Max Roberts served in the United States Army for twenty years, including two tours in Vietnam as an aircraft mechanic. He has served on the Alabama State Board of Veterans Affairs and is a member of several Veteran Service Organizations.






The guest speaker for the Tribute was Kent Davis (Rear Admiral, Retried), the Commissioner of the Alabama Department of Veterans Affairs. He gave a quick update on the Command Sergeant Major Bennie Adkins State Veterans Home with the groundbreaking scheduled for early 2022 and an opening date in 2023.

The city also recognized a World War II Veteran from the area and proclaimed his 100^{th} Birthday, 31 December, 2021, as Private First-Class Frederick Douglas Newby day. He was drafted in 1942 and served 30 months overseas, including Iwo Jima and Hawaii. He worked at Sessions Peanut Company and then Fort Rucker where he was in civilian service for 40 years. He

is believed to be the oldest living Veteran in Enterprise.

And on 13 November, Sam Boswell Honda conducted their semi-annual flag replacement/retirement ceremony. The Post Commander was the Master of Ceremonies and we provided the color guard for the reading of the 'Thirteen Folds'. During the ceremony, Oneal Boswell provided the VFW, Wiregrass Wounded Veterans Committee, Disabled American Veterans, America Legion and Friends of Army Aviation with a check from the proceeds garnered during the carnival hosted by Sam Boswell Honda in October.

SBP Election Changes

SBP coverage can only be terminated during the second year after retirement. Once this window has closed, service members cannot "dis-enroll" from SBP except as outlined below.

If the selected beneficiary passes away, the service member must alert DFAS in order to stop the premiums. No premiums will be refunded, and the service member's participation is "suspended," pending the gain of another eligible beneficiary.

In the event of a divorce, the service member may also "suspend" SBP coverage, as long as Former Spouse coverage is not mandated in the divorce decree. The service member will need to contact DFAS within one year of the divorce.

If the service member remarries following their first spouse's death or divorce (assuming there is no Former Spouse coverage), the service member has three options to cover their new spouse:

- Resume identical coverage they had initially; cannot decrease level of coverage
- Increase level of coverage if they were not at maximum level initially
- Elect not to resume coverage. This decision is irrevocable and must be declared to DFAS within one year of the remarriage or the initial level of coverage obtained by member will resume automatically

A retiree may "withdraw" from SBP, with the consent of their spouse, if the retiree has a total and permanent service-connected disability (100%) for 10 continuous years, or at least 5 years at 100% if from the date of service separation. This option was established because the spouse would automatically be eligible for DIC (for 2021 at \$1357.56 per month), which would still be subject to SBP-DIC offset. This withdrawal is irrevocable and previously paid premiums are not refunded. Two major considerations before employing this option:

- 1) MOAA is working diligently to repeal the SBP-DIC offset. We have made some headway over the past few years
- 2) DIC offset may not totally "deplete" the SBP annuity. SBP withdrawal may deny your beneficiary the opportunity for additional compensation at the time of your passing, or full SBP/DIC payments if the DIC offset is repealed. Consider each implication and impact, with respect to the surviving spouse's supplemental income or lack thereof.

COINS LEFT ON TOMBSTONES

Did you KNOW?

While visiting some cemeteries you may notice that headstones marking certain graves have coins on them, left by previous visitors to the grave.

These coins have distinct meanings when left on the headstones of those who gave their life while serving in America's military, and these meanings vary depending on the denomination of coin.

A coin left on a headstone or at the grave site is meant as a message to the deceased soldier's family that someone else has visited the grave to pay respect.

- Leaving a penny at the grave site means you visited.
- A nickel indicates that you and the deceased trained at boot camp together.
- A dime means you served with him in some capacity.
- By leaving a quarter at the grave, you are telling the family that you were with the solider when he was killed.

According to tradition, the money left at graves in national cemeteries and state veterans cemeteries is eventually collected, and the funds are put toward maintaining the cemetery or paying burial costs for indigent veterans.

In the US, this practice became common during the Vietnam war, due to the political divide in the country over the war; leaving a coin was seen as a more practical way to communicate that you had visited the grave than contacting the soldier's family, which could devolve into an uncomfortable argument over politics relating to the war.



Some Vietnam veterans would leave coins as a "down payment" to buy their fallen comrades a beer or play a hand of cards when they would finally be reunited.

The tradition of leaving coins on the headstones of military men and women can be traced to as far back as the Roman Empire.
